


But everyone in that room filled with bright dreams may whispered this one way or another:

CREED OF THE RISING SCHOLARS


We are Sun Life Foundation's Rising Scholars. We are beacons of hope, differing in backgrounds, however united in the pursuit and call for service.

And destroys our boat.)



Kapitan raised his hand, beckoning everyone to go down the beach. Curious and excited, the rag-tag group wanted a closer look at the boats. It was a far cry from their devastated vessels after Yolanda hit hard last year. Even the skies were different then.

One by one, Kapitan and his posse tried to identify the names written on the sides. He assumed they were trees – some familiar like Narra, some amusing like Jacaranda. The leader that he was, Kapitan set foot inside the boat. Later, he knew his itay will take it out to sea, hoping for a good catch. After all, it's the only livelihood they have. Not just him, but the whole barangay.

TALE OF A VILLAGE

THE LEGACY OF LIGHT VILLAGE WITH ABS-CBN LINGKOD KAPAMILYA FOUNDATION

Step into the Legacy of Light Village. Even after the devastation of typhoons, the streets were kept clean and orderly. Though a bit damaged, the fences still retain a yellow hue with vegetation growing over and under. Abundance and hope shines through amidst the struggles that its residents face.

After building houses with a garden by its entrance, the Village welcomed two more additions to its vast compound: the Sun Life Learning Center and the Sun Life Gym and Community Center. Located within the Legacy of Light community, the Learning Center will be the hub for livelihood and capability training programs. The homeowners association will also hold office there.

But the whole Village buzz with even more excitement over the Gym and Community Center. Arts and theater enthusiasts can sit in workshops to be conducted in the communal space. Tutorial sessions will also be held for students, some of whom are Bantay Edukasyon scholars funded by Sun Life and Lingkod Kapamilya.

In the horizon, the mountains of Laguna stand grand and foreboding of brighter things to arrive.

LEGACY OF LIGHT VILLAGE

As a long-term commitment to create a sustainable future, the Legacy of Light Village is a resettlement community for families who used to live along the banks of Ilog Pasig. Livelihood projects train residents to be entrepreneurs, from duck farming to technical courses like cosmetics and welding.

NO LONGER A HOBBY

MASAYA'T MASAGANANG PAMILYA PROGRAM WITH HAPINOY

"Kaya anak, kelangan matuto kang mag-ipon," Loren's nanay softly told her. They were counting how many packs of biscuit and rolls of candy are left for the week. It was a new kind of family time that started a few weeks ago, when her parents became scholars for the Masaya's Masaganang Pamilya program.


A lot has changed since nanay started 'school' again: a big notebook records ALL expenses in neat columns (even the ones tatay would sneak out once in a while), weekly checklist of items in the store, and even a piggy bank to put in my savings from my allowance. They are doing everything together when it comes to their sari-sari store and its earnings.


"Anak, tulong-tulong tayo dito sa tindahan natin," nanay would say more often. Loren used to just look after the store on weekends and after school. Now she is being taught when to replenish stock and even to call out on utangs from their neighbors. It has become more than playtime.

"Kasi business natin ito, hindi lang libangan."

HAPINOY

When Typhoon Yolanda hit Eastern Visayas, it changed the dynamics of its communities. From the lost of lives to the diminished opportunities to earn a living, Sun Lifers pooled in donations and staged creative fund-raising activities for 'Project Bagong Araw.' Facilitated by MicroVentures under the Hapinoy program, it offered a six-month training program to nanay storeowners-scholars and their husbands about managing their business, which also includes personal finance lessons

SIGHT-SAVING MISSIONS WITH EPHPHETA

Blindness seems to be Inang Loreta's destiny. Years working in a factory stitching garments took its toll on her eyes, along with old age and a life where she still needs to earn a comfortable retirement.

The long hours and difficult conditions formed into misty clouds that tears cannot take away. These milestones, whether she triumphed over it or lay down in defeat, hardened and settled like a milky curtain shrouding her vision. Her cataract, which started from one eye and is now slowly creeping into the other, limits Inang Loreta. She cannot even eat by her own volition.

Beside her is a niece who took time off work to accompany her during the day of operation. Squeezing her Inang fondly, she looks into her bandaged eyes. She cannot wait to see the glow of life twinkle in those eyes once again.





MEALS TO NOURISH THE BODY AND SOUL

Jasmin Florendo: At that time, my family really had a financial crisis. I have eight siblings and only three of them have work. My parents only have part-time jobs so they earn less than what they need. At the time, they send me money once or twice a month. It was a hard time for me because I can only eat once or twice a day.

Nicole Maggie Sotomayor: After the Bohol earthquake, my parents were really in a difficult situation and we didn't have a place to stay anymore. We stayed at our neighbor's house. My mom really felt uncomfortable because we were not paying rent. But our neighbors were really good to us and we wanted to repay them by helping in the household expenses.

Krystal Joy Lim: Before and after the typhoon, I wasn't able to contact them immediately and I didn't know what happened to them. I felt helpless. Bantayan is just a small island and it is really vulnerable to calamities. I felt like my world was going to shatter because my family is my strength. Good thing they were safe.

BRIGADA ESKWELA & BACK TO SCHOOL KITS

BRIGADA ESKWELA

It was the first time that Tenement Elementary School was chosen to be a beneficiary of the long-running Brigada Eskwela partnership with the Department of Education. More than 120 Sun Lifers, both old and new bloods, gathered together to paint and clean classrooms and other supplies. It has become a tradition that volunteers could sometimes regard as a 'baptism of fire' for new employees.

SOMETHING NEW, NOT RECYCLED

Sitio 6 in Brgy. Catmon is a dumpsite area serving as a repository of trash from surrounding cities. Here, children do informal work by looking for valuables that can be repurposed or be sold at a profit. In time for the school year, the Foundation gave 800 bags of back-to-school kits to one of the most marginalized sectors of urban communities.

INITIATIVE FOR BRIGHTER HEALTH AND DISASTER RELIEF

With health as one of the Foundation's pillars and a primary concern for disaster response, two initiatives highlighted its importance in building a brighter world. In their own simple way, Sun Lifers have been saving lives for more than a decade with regular Bloodletting Drives for the Philippine National Red Cross. And when Typhoon Mario and monsoon rains hit Metro Manila and neighboring provinces, the company were among the first to give assistance with 500 hygiene kits to affected residents of Brgy. Tumana in Marikina.


"Hey, Gino. Gino! Where's your head? Nagkakalat ka ah."
